Only aristocratic women used a khan, but Chao Muang were allowed to wear the um.

Khan Maak is the ceremonial procession of the groom's family, relatives, and friends to the bride's residence, conducted in the middle of the traditional Thai wedding. The formal journey, pomp, and circumstance, signify the marriage of two

The "Rod Nam Sang" is a very touching and warm moment: deep emotional ties between the bride and groom, respect for one another and respect to the families, and bless from monks, relatives, and guests is a very important part of a wedding, as it strengthens bonds between each participant and the married couple by sharing auspicious thoughts and good fortune of the family and the community as a whole. To do this, special guests such as your parents, in-laws, and your sponsors will sing Thai traditional songs while placing long, elegant "Sai Monks" onto your wrists. The Sai Monks are tied onto the wrists by using a thread, and afterward, the thread is cut after the money is attached at each end. 5. Legal Requirements for Foreigners Getting Married in Thailand

Most couples would wish to be married under Thai law, and this will necessitate an understanding that Thai marriage laws will apply. In Thailand, all foreigners are obligated to secure a Certificate of No Impediment before being married. When one has been married previously, the certificate should show the status of the person. Such certification can be obtained from the person's embassy in Thailand. For you to have this certificate, you must have your passport and divorce and death certificates plus the payment for the embassy. Some embassies require a translated copy of divorce and death certificates beforehand of accepting the request. A valid Thai visa is also a requirement upon application for the Certificate of No Impediment. The Thai Immigration Bureau will issue a certification that will prove non-immigrant visas. Once the Certificate of No Impediment has been issued by the embassy in Thailand, translation of the "Document of Marriage" should be undertaken by either the Department of Consular Affairs or the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Bangkok. In other parts of Thailand, foreigners may approach local translators or translation companies. The translated document must be faxed to their respective Amphur office before they prepare to go. Amphur can marry at the district office. Any district office in Thailand can officiate his marriage at the time. He should also be accompanied by two

witnesses at the time of marriage. One of them should be a citizen of Thailand, with representation from Thai legal counsel, along with the Penchant Criminal Court. In the case of couples with children, they are legally obliged to have their marriage registered. In this case, if one of the couples is a foreigner on a non-immigrant visa, there is no need for a certificate of no appellate interference from the foreigner's country embassy. The foreign embassy or any concern government agencies may be requiring the letter from the Thai Immigration Bureau to attest the legitimacy of foreigner's residence in Thailand. The letter is granted on an individual case basis.
